FRIBIS wishes you a Happy New Year. Looking back at 2022 and ahead to 2023

As the new year unfolds, we are pleased to look back with you on twelve exciting and productive months: The 2022 FRIBIS Annual Conference in October was dedicated to the topic of Basic Income and Development. Leading basic income researchers and activists participated, with keynotes by Sarath Davala and Miriam Laker-Oketta (now available on YouTube). In November, the anthology of the 2021 Annual Conference was published, along with discussion papers and Policy-Papers all of which addressed the academic and socio-political debate on basic income. FRIBIS has also continued to grow and strengthen its international network, resulting in the establishment of new research teams. The FRIBIS Lecture Series featured talks by renowned basic income researchers and can be viewed on our YouTube-Channel.

The new year 2023 kicks off with the <u>FRIBIS Winter School</u> (16.01-20.01.23), led by one of the most important basic income researchers around: Philippe van Parijs, who will explore together with the participants the question of what today's social crises and challenges mean for the feasibility of a basic income. Prof. van Parijs will also be giving a hybrid evening lecture on January 19 (for more information, see below).


